BIOS

Sheli DeLaney (KTOO, Arts & Culture Producer) began working for KTOO Public Media in 2016 in the role of Operations Manager for the radio stations KTOO, KRNN, and KXLL. As a producer for KTOO Music & Arts, she has hosted and helped to produce the daily live talk show Juneau Afternoon on KTOO, as well as the music shows Shel's Bells on KXLL and Women's Prerogative and Music Monday on KRNN. She has coordinated the radio and video broadcasts of productions such as *At Home with the Juneau Symphony, The Alaska Folk Festival, Poetry Out Loud*, and *Wearable Art.* She is also a board member of the Alaska Folk Festival.

Donnie Gott (Stage Manager, *Reeling*, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is honored to have been born and raised a guest on Lingit Aani. She is grateful to be a part of this project. She enjoys supporting Juneau's rich artistic community, making coffee at the Alaska State Capitol, hanging with her children, and subverting the patriarchy. This is her first time stage managing for Theater Alaska.

George Holly, Yuxgitsiy-Gunanaa Gooch (Storyteller, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is a Deg Xit'an storyteller and songster. He joins us from the Haa Tóo Yei Yatee Lingít Language Violin Program at Sit Eetí Shaanaxh - Glacier Valley Elementary. He believes all people can support the language and identity of the place they live. It's within us!

Daaxkudein, Ch'aak' kudi hit, Kaagwaantaan Tommy Jimmie (Storyteller, Cultural Specialist, The Beginning of Eagle) is from the Eagle nest house, and of the burnt house people. In the mid-seventies he was awarded an apprenticeship grant from the Alaska State Arts Council which focused on the indigenous place-names of Haines, Alaska with Austin Hammond. In 1978 he attended the University of Oslo in Norway as a representative of native peoples of Alaska. The focus of the university's summer term was on the subject of peace. He was chosen to attend this summer term because of his knowledge of Tlingit practices and peaceful efforts. He worked professionally for years as an educator, and then, as an addictions counselor. Throughout his career he incorporated culture and language as a large part of what he shared. For personal and medical reasons he retired in 2000 but he continues to share stories, still today, with both children and adults. His interest and passion for these stories only intensifies as he grows older and it seems only natural to him to become more responsible as an Elder to be sure our children carry them on into the future with them. aa tlein gunalcheesh hoho, hoho.

Victoria Johnson Tléi<u>kw xo</u>o - Among the berries (Cultural Specialist, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is Alaskan Native from the Northern Salt Water Tlingit, Raven Moiety, T'akdeintaan Clan, from the Freshwater Marked Sockeye House from Hoonah, AK. She was born and raised in Juneau, Hoonah, Tenakee, Alaska and Seattle, Washington. She is artist and owner of Raven's Creations, actress, storyteller, Tlingit language and Cultural apprentice and educator. She worked with Sealaska Heritage-Naa Kahidí Theatre, Perseverance Theatre - *Battle of Fire and Water*, McPhetres Hall - *Blue Ticket*, and produced *Raven's Tales* from playwright David Hunsaker for an Annual Fundraiser for the Juneau-Douglas High School - Early Scholars Program.

Frank Henry Kaash Katasse (Playwright, *Reeling*) is an Alaska Native from the Tlingit clan Tsaagweidí. Frank is an actor, director, producer, improviser, educator and playwright. Frank received his Bachelor's Degree in Theatre Arts from the University of Hawai'i: Mānoa. In 2017, Frank's play *They Don't Talk Back* received an NNPN rolling world premiere at Perseverance Theatre, Native Voices at the Autry, and La Jolla Playhouse.

Flordelino Lagundino (Director, *Reeling*) is the producing artistic director of Theater Alaska. He is a director, actor, and producer. His directing credits include: A Midsummer Night's Dream, Macbeth (Theater Alaska); Fuente Ovejuna-upcoming (Theater for a New Audience); Aubergine (Park Square Theatre); FOB (Drama League DirectorFest); Trigger (Leviathan Lab); Deliverance-workshop (Syracuse Stage); Un-workshop (Pan Asian Rep); Sweeney Todd, Doubt, Yellowman, Cedar House, and Animals Out of Paper (Perseverance Theatre); Flipzoids, The Reincarnation of Stories, True West, and Shakespeare's R&J (Generator Theater Company); Sweeney Todd (Juneau Symphony); In the Next Room (or the Vibrator Play), Much Ado About Nothing, Stone Cold Dead Serious, In the Blood (Brown University/Trinity Repertory Company). Ed Littlefieldk, Shaakindustóow - Lingít (Foley Artist, Reeling, The Beginning of Eagle) is a freelance percussionist, educator, and composer based out of Seattle, WA. He is Lingít from Sitka, Alaska and has released three albums featuring traditional native melodies, which he also arranged into the jazz idiom with the Native Jazz Quartet. This guartet also represented the United States in South America as "Jazz Ambassadors" through the American Music Abroad program. For film he composed a song for the 2009 Disney movie The Proposal for Betty White's character and played the percussion score and consulted on indigenous music for the 2022 documentary Exposing Muybridge. Ed has played K'alyaan in the world-premiere of Battles of Fire and Water by Dave Hunsaker and written and performed an original musical score for Eurydice by Sara Ruhl for Perseverance Theatre in Juneau, Alaska. He has done sound design and composition for the world premieres of Our Voices Will Be Heard by Vera Starbard, and was the composer and cultural advisor for They Don't Talk Back by Frank Katasse at Native voices at the Autry, La Jolla Playhouse and Perseverance Theatre. He also did sound design for Off the Rails by Randy Reinholz at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival and Sovereight by Mary Kathryn Nagle at Arena Stage. Most recently he composed the songs for a new play produced by the University of Illinois -Urbana-Champaign called The Neverland by Madeline Sayet. Currently he is working on a three-year project to create the first ever Lingít opera. This project will combine traditional contemporary Lingít melodies inside the western opera genre and will also include an all-indigenous cast. Ed is also an active educator around the country facilitating artist residencies for students and teachers to help them learn more about Lingít culture and music and traditional ways of knowing.

Jared Olin (Director, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is Tl'eeyegge Hut'aane, and grew up in Notaalee Denh. He most recently performed as Abraham Barnett for Skybound Entertainment's *The Walking Dead: Last Mile.*

Alfie Price (Actor, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is Ts'msyen, Haida and Tlingit and is Gisbutwada (Killerwhale clan). He's one of the co-founders of the Juneau Sm'algy_ax (Ts'msyen language) learners group. He works in I.T. and enjoys Native dancing, going for walks and photography.

Cate Ross (Board Member Juneau Ghost Light Theatre) has been a board member with Juneau Ghost Light Theatre since 2017 where during the pandemic, in collaboration with KTOO, she produced two radio plays (*A Sherlock Holmes Radio Mystery*, and *Dracula*). She is also an actor and performing artist in many other capacities. Favorite recent roles include Winnifred (*WITCH*, Theatre In the Rough), Hermia (*A Midsummer Night's Dream*, Theater Alaska), and Joan/the Susan Deys (*Fun Home*, Perseverance Theatre). Cheryl Snyder (KTOO, Vice President & General Manager, KTOO Music & Arts) has been working in public broadcasting for 25 years. In that time she has led, produced and coordinated dozens of projects that connect community groups, artists, musicians, teachers and culture bearers with broadcast audiences across Alaska. She served on the Juneau Arts and Humanities Board for six years and is a board member emeritus.

Vera Starbard (Playwright, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is a Tlingit and Dena'ina writer and editor. She is Playwright-in-Residence at Perseverance Theatre through the Andrew W. Mellon National Playwright Residency Program and Editor of First Alaskans Magazine. Vera is also a writer for the PBS Kids children's program *Molly of Denali*, which won a Peabody Award in 2020. She has won numerous local, statewide and national individual writing and editing awards, including the Rasmuson Foundation Individual Artist Award and Alaska Literary Award. Vera currently serves on the HowlRound Advisory Council, and Kachemak Bay Writers' Conference Board, as well as serving as a founding member of Alaska Native playwright group Dark Winter Productions. Her full-length play *Our Voices Will Be Heard* premiered at Perseverance Theatre in 2016. It was then published in the textbook Contemporary Plays by Women of Color in 2017, and turned into a one-hour radio adaptation that aired nationwide in 2018.

Kaaláaa Miriah Twitchell (Mother Moon, Eagle Sister, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is Inupiaq on her mother's side and from the Bourdon family in Sitŋasuaq, or Nome, and her father immigrated from Iran. She was adopted by the Dakl'aweidí Kéet Gooshí Hít, has resided in Juneau for fourteen years, and works to support culture and language revitalization. Miriah is grateful to live and raise a family on Lingít Aani, and to be returning to performing arts.

Andrew Tripp, Shkáx Kawdulaak (Uncle Earth, *The Beginning of Eagle*) was born and raised in Alaska. He lives in Juneau with his beautiful wife and 3 children. He is a local Tlingit artist who works at Mt Juneau trading post and is aspiring to one day make voice acting part of his life as well.

Erin Tripp, Xáalnook (Baby Eagle, Flicker Woman, *The Beginning of Eagle*) is a Lingít actor, passionate about working on projects that uplift Indigenous stories and people across all mediums. Most recently, she filmed for ABC's *Alaska Daily*. Her latest theater projects have included Frank Katasse's *Where the Summit Meets the Stars* at Perseverance Theatre, *We the Peoples Before* at The Kennedy Center and *Othello* at the South Dakota Shakespeare Festival. She's lent her voice to the audiobooks for *The Smell of Other People's Houses* and *Everyone Dies Famous in a Small Town* by Bonnie-Sue Hitchcock.
